No Notice Required

No notification to school district needed. Parents have maximum freedom.
Examples: Alaska, Connecticut, Idaho

Low Regulation

Notification required, but minimal oversight or requirements.
Examples: Texas, California, Nevada

Moderate Regulation

Notification plus testing or evaluation required.
Examples: Florida, Virginia, Ohio

High Regulation

Multiple requirements including curriculum approval or teacher qualifications.
Examples: New York, Pennsylvania
